#### The Chosen – Season 3 - Episode 3

## Physician, Heal Yourself

### Scripture:

- >What Jesus read at the synagogue <u>Isaiah 61:1-2</u>
  >Elisha heals Naaman of leprosy <u>2 Kings 5</u>
- >The fate of false prophets <u>Deuteronomy 18:20-22</u>
- >Elijah and the Famine <u>1 Kings 17</u>
  >The passages inside the mezuzah -<u>Deuteronomy 6:4-9</u> (The Shema) and <u>Deuteronomy 11:13-21</u>

### **Synopsis:**

The episode begins with a flashback to Jesus' childhood where we see him learning to walk and playing as a toddler with his mother and Lazarus. We then leap ahead to after the Sermon On The Mount, where Jesus returns to his mother's home in Nazareth for <u>Rosh Hashanah</u>. Ominously, Jesus tells his mother he will need *the box* which we later learn contains a mule's bit and bridle passed down through the tribe of Judah from the time of the Exodus. At the Rosh Hashanah celebrations Jesus shows his lack of skill at a game of <u>Trigon</u> and Rabbi Benjamin agrees to let Jesus speak at synagogue that afternoon. In his synagogue teaching Jesus says he is the long-awaited Messiah, to the shock and anger of many. When Jesus will not retract his claim he is led away to be thrown off a cliff. As Jesus is marched to the edge of the cliff he says "*This isn't going to happen, not today*" and walks away through the crowd who are too amazed or stunned to react. The episode concludes with Jesus, his mother and Lazarus contemplating the tomb of his father. Jesus says "*There is no turning back … not after today.*"

# Memorable Lines of Dialogue:

| Jesus to his mother:   | Eema, I'm going to need the box while I'm here.  |
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| Rafi to Jesus:   | Don't be surprised if some people run out of wine on purpose just to see what you will do.   |
| Lazarus to Jesus:  | And being a Rabbi like you are, with the lack of<br>schooling you got – amazing!   |

## For Discussion:

- 1. What stood out for you in this episode? What caught your attention, touched your heart or was particularly relevant for you?
- 2. Why do you think the writers of The Chosen show Jesus not being adept at sports (he loses at the game of Trigon)? What point are they trying to make about Jesus?
- 3. In response to Rabbi Benjamin's threat of punishment under the Law of Moses, Jesus says "*I* **am** the Law of Mosses". While there is no record in scripture of Jesus making this declaration, how might it be a fitting description of him?
- 4. Why do you think Rafi (shown on Jesus' left in the picture on page 1) was such an eager member of the crowd marching Jesus to his death, given that Rafi had witnessed Jesus' first miracle – turning the water into wine at the wedding in Cana?
- 5. This episode introduces a new story line the bridle being passed down in Jesus' family ("the tribe of Judah") from generation to generation, beginning forty generations back at the time of the Exodus. The bridle story is not biblical so why do you think the writers of The Chosen gave it such prominence?
- 6. In this episode we see Jesus following the Jewish custom of kissing the mezuzah as he enters his mother's home. Brandon Robbins explains the significance of the custom in <u>this</u> segment<sup>1</sup> from his *The Chosen Explained* video for this episode.

If you were going to install a mezuzah on the doorway into your home, what passage(s) of scripture would you put in it? Why would you choose these?

7. This statement from Jesus seemed to be the one that particularly upset people in the synagogue:

"If you cannot accept that you are spiritually poor and captive in the same way that a gentile woman and a Syrian leper recognized their need. If you do not realize that you need a year of the Lord's favor ... then I cannot save you."

Why do you think that statement was so upsetting to those who heard it?

What might a year of the Lord's favor look like today?
